PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION: Describe present appearance of structure/site, then contrast and compare that with it's original appearance, noting additions, alterations, and changes in materials. Discuss significant architectural features.

This one story L-shaped Queen Anne cottage with an asphalt shingle and cedar shingle hip roof has a concrete foundation and is of frame construction with brick veneer siding. Windows are fixed with transoms and double hung one over one. There is one interior stovepipe.

Other design features include two dormers, one gable on the west side with returned eaves, and one gable on the east side covered with beveled lap siding, segmentally arched windows with wooden sills, a half porch with turned posts, spindle frieze, and Japanese railing, decorative scrollwork with a pendant in the eaves, a sunburst pattern and imbrication in the polygonal bay, and a transom above the single light entry with relief work.

This 24'x29' house was built for \$850. by Augustus Morgan, a partner in the Morgan Brothers Loans, Real Estate and Insurance business. Their office was at 28 W. Granite. They also built a similar house at 1259 E. Second.

This Queen Anne cottage maintains historical integrity of design, materials, workmanship, location, setting, feeling and association.

HISTORICAL and/or ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE: Justify how the persons, important events, or historical patterns associated with structure/site lend the property significance and/or describe the ways in which the structure embodies the distinctive characteristics of a particular period, building type, or style.

This Queen Anne cottage is a contributing element of the Butte Historic Landmark District.

These houses, smaller in scale than the traditional Queen Anne house appeared primarily in the 1890s and followed a basic plan of hip-roofed main block with gable-topped polygonal bay and adjacent porch. These houses were common throughout many parts of Butte, Centerville and Walkerville. They used mass-produced decorative features available at local lumber and glass companies to add color and distinction to working people's homes. Elements used in various combinations included spindle friezes, scroll brackets, turned posts and balustrades, cut and spindle gable aprons, fancy shingles and stained and beveled glass.

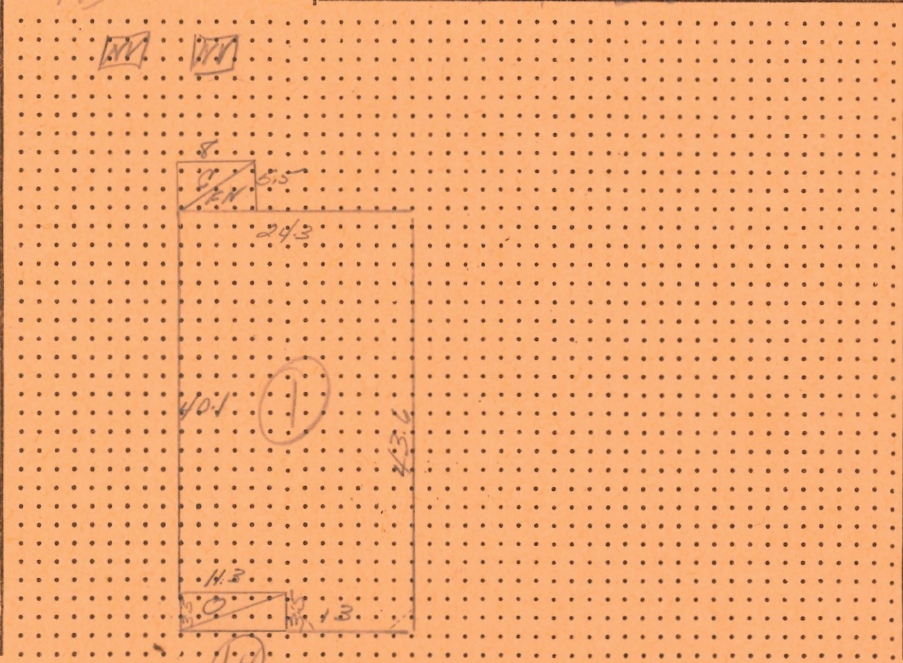

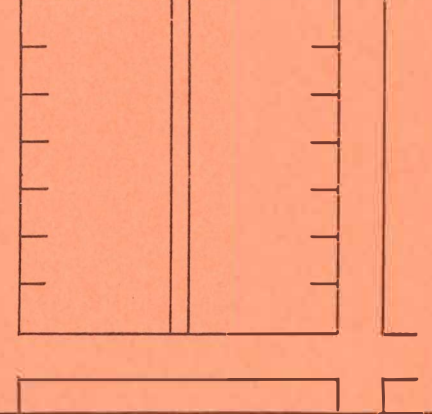

The eldest of the group, William Kitto, is 70, while the youngest, Dorothy Joan, is less than 18 months.

To be the head of a family of 17, every one of whom—with two exceptions—were born, reared, and—in the case of the adults—educated in Butte and all of whom are now residents of this city is the distinction of William Kitto, resident of this city for nearly half a century. All of the grownup of the Kitto family are graduates of the Butte high school and one, Mrs. Oscar Dingman, received a portion of her higher education at the University of Montana.

Mr. and Mrs. Kitto were born in England. Mr. Kitto arrived in Butte 48 years ago which, in itself, considering his continuous residence in this city, is said to be a distinction not enjoyed by many. At that

time he had no thought that he would one day enjoy the honor of being the patriarch of a highly representative American family and one which has the unusual characteristic of remaining together as residents of the city in which they were born.

William Kitto, in addition to his fine family, has other claims of distinction. He built the first brick house in Silver Bow park. It still stands at 150 Plum street. The water with which to mix the mortar was carried in water buckets. There was no water system in Silver Bow park in those days. He was also the first blacksmith at the Pennsylvania mine. When he blew in the first forge at that shaft the Pennsylvania was only a prospect hole.

The honor of standing at the

head of a representative Butte family is shared with Mr. Kitto by his wife who also is a pioneer resident. She came to Butte 46 years ago to join her husband. Both mother and father enjoy good health. Mr. and Mrs. Kitto's family is not only Butte born, bred and present residents of this city but the adult members are all engaged in useful endeavor. James Kitto, a son, is owner of the Butte Rapid Transit company. Howard Kitto is a well-known and popular young musician. Wilmot Kitto is an electrician employed by the Anaconda company. Oscar Dingman, son-in-law is professor of metallurgy at the School of Mines.

Stability appears to be an outstanding characteristic of the Kitto family. Mr. and Mrs. Kitto have resided continuously in this city

from the first day of their arrival. The family has been as loyal to their homestead as to their city. They have lived for 36 years at 1305 East Second street.

The two members of the family who are not Butte born are Professor Dingman and his son, Andy. The group represents a considerable span of life between the eldest and the youngest. Mr. Kitto is 70 years of age. The youngest child in the picture is less than 18 months.
