



MARJORIE MATTISON TAKEN BY DEATH

Only Child of Mr. and Mrs. C. Mattison Passed Away After a Brief Illness.

A sad blow to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mattison, of this city, is the death of their only child, Marjorie, after a brief illness. The little girl had reached the age of nearly four years, her birthday being on the twenty-fourth of this month. The occurrence has brought greater sorrow to the stricken parents because of the fact that it was unexpected, the illness of the little one having been brief and at first not attended with any serious symptoms.

The child was taken ill a week ago with what was supposed to be a slight stomach affection, but on last Sunday it developed into spinal meningitis. This disease was well under control on Tuesday of this week when it became complicated with pneumonia and the end came in a few hours. The little girl passed away on Tuesday evening.

Marjorie was a remarkably bright and pretty child and had many friends among adults as well as children. The parents are overwhelmed with grief at their loss, and have the deep sympathy in their affliction of a wide circle of friends and acquaintances.

The body of Mrs. Charles Mattison, widow of a widely-known former Butte attorney, will arrive Tuesday from Berkeley, Calif., where she died Friday following an illness.

The body is at Whites' funeral home.







PROMINENT, SURGEON LEAVES TO MAKE HIS HOME IN SOUTH **AFTER MANY YEARS IN BUT**

With the departure yesterday of Dr. T. C. Witherspoon, former president of the Murray Hospital association and chief of staff of that institution for many years, for Los Angeles, where he will make his home, Butte lost one of its leading surgeons and active civic workers.

Dr. Witherspoon, accompanied by Mrs. Witherspoon and Miss Louise Sanders, daughter of Captain and Mrs. L. P. Sanders, who will be a guest at the new home of the surgeon and his wife during the winter months, left yesterday morning by automobile. The doctor has disposed of his Butte interests.

"I am very tired and want a rest." Dr. Witherspoon replied yesterday when asked why he was leaving Butte, which has been his home for many years. "I want to get to a country where the climate is less severe than the winter climate of Butte. Of course, I regret to leave.

"I have undergone three major operations during the last five years and I realize that I am not as young as I once was and I need to be under less physical stress than I am here. It is hard to part from the dear friends whose associations I have deeply cherished. That's the hardest part of going," he said.

While in California a year ago, Dr.

Witherspoon purchased a house with the view to making it his home some day. He disposed of his South Excelsior street residence to T. J. Taylor ir., manager of the United States the Silv Building and Loan association, and Legion.

gave up his position at the Murray hospital Friday evening.

The doctor does not expect to give up his work entirely when in California but will confine his work to abdominal surgery. For several years he has been getting away from general surgery and is now considered one of the best in this line.

Dr. Witherspoon's native state is Missouri. In St. Louis he grew to manhood and received his medical education. He came to Butte in 1889, where he practiced for a short time. He later returned to St. Louis, where he followed his profession, and again came to Butte in 1907.

He became associated with the Murray hospital with Dr. J. J. Murray and at the death of Dr. Campbell several years ago he became president of the association. A year ago, finding his duties too heavy, he resigned that position and remained as chief surgeon of the institution.

During the World war Dr. Witherspoon entered the army and was assigned to a hospital near Dijon, France. After the war he was com-mander for some time of Hospital No. 66 of the United States Reserves, which is composed of mobile units.

He was for many years a leader in Montana Rotary affairs and a charter member of the Butte club. He served as Rotary district-governor for a year and has been a delegate from Butte to several international conventions. He is also a member of the Silver Bow club and the American

FORMER BUTTE MAN IS VISITOR

Dr. T. C. Witherspoon and Mrs. Witherspoon Here From California.

Dr. T. C. Witherspoon, Montana's outstanding surgeon and physician for many years, and who retired to southern California nine years ago, is a Butte visitor. He is accompanied by his wife. They are registered at the New Finlen.

Dr. Witherspoon's home is located near the sea shore, near Santa Monica, where he is able to enjoy the cool sea breeze while inland towns are sweltering in the heat. Dr. Witherspoon lived too many years in Montana, he says, to enjoy torrid temperatures. This is not the rule with Montana "expatriates" it seems, He stated that Dr. Charles Chapman, former pastor of St. John's Episcopal church, who removed to California a few years ago for health reasons, is living in one of the valleys near Los Angeles where the temperature is tropical. "I visited him recently" Dr. Witherspoon said "and found the temperature to be 114. Whew!"

California, he said, is enjoying average conditions economically with hope for improvement in various lines. The country has advantages which attract many people. "I predict," he said "that one day land that is now occupied by fruit groves and bean farms will be a solid block of buildings. The entire district will be one huge city extending for miles on miles." The former Butte surgeon, who built up an enviable reputation in his profession while he was still in his 20s, is apparently in excellent health and full of vigor.





This two story remodeled Victorian residence with a wood and asphalt shingled hip and gable roof has a stuccoed-over foundation and is of frame construction with possible brick veneer construction with stucco applied to all wall surfaces. Windows are mostly double hung. The front polygonal bay windows have arched upper sashes. There are two interior brick chimneys.

A well dome roofed polygonal turret in the southeast corner (Excelsior & Galena) has elaborate frieze (one of the only wall details remaining). It is over a south and east wrapping porch, enclosed with multi-lites.

HISTORICAL INFORMATION: Describe the persons, important events, and/or historical patterns associated with the structure/site and surrounding area.

The first Sanborn Map that included this area is the 1900 edition; the information for buildings on S. Excelsior was not located in the 1900 Census; Daybooks for the Columbia Lode (aka Dolman Addition) begin in 1909. This building first appears on the 1900 Sanborn, but no building permit was discovered to document its construction.

Research of the plats in the Silver Bow Assessor's office indicated that Charles Mattison purchases a parcel of land in the COlumbia Lode from John Slemmons in 1897 or 1898. The description of the property was by meets and bounds, but the 1900 Polk directory verrified Mattison's residence as 15 S. Excelsior. Mattison was a lawyer with the firm Forbis and Mattison, offices at 47 E. Broadway.

The historical integrity of this Victorian dwelling has been somewhat compromised by the application of stucco siding.

This Victorian dwelling, although slightly altered, is a contributing element of the Butte National Landmark District. It is a good example of high style Victorian architecture and is an integral part of the facade of substantive homes which flank Excelsior St.
